A pair of events – the Brewery Art Walk and Art Crawl X – have October overstuffed with creativity. Always exciting, the Brewery Art Walk is an enormous open house of the world's largest art colony. More than 100 artists will open their studios and galleries during the two-day event geared toward both the serious and not-so-serious art collectors. A few miles to the west, the annual Art Crawl, now in its 10th year, will showcase the galleries of Silver Lake, Los Feliz, Echo Park and Atwater. In addition to the neighborhood galleries, a variety of retail shops will participate by offering exhibitions of work by local and visiting artists.
